

Reading

Class Book - Skellig

We will be reading Skellig by David Almond and using this text to show our love for reading. In class, we will be focusing on the language, structure and presentation of different texts and answering questions relating to how the authors have used these features specifically. We will also be continue to answer inference and retrieval questions, focusing on the speed and accuracy of our answers.

Writing

To begin with, we will be looking at how to use dialogue correctly and how it can be used effectively to create conversations, quotations and dramatic scenes during news reports and narratives. We will then be using these skills to write news reports about a character winning the lottery and a mysterious creature being found. Linking with our history focus on Slavery, we will write a diary entry about a day in the life of a slave. We will then be using our writing skills to persuade people as to why it is right to give money to charities for those less fortunate than us.

Maths

In Maths, we will be looking at measurement, perimeter, area and volume and using our knowledge of converting units of measurements to reason and problem solve. We will also be looking at percentages and solving a range of problems linked with fractions, decimals and percentages. Throughout the term, we will continue to focus on our arithmetic skills and complete weekly assessments to identify any further learning required.

Homework

Homework will continue to be given out on a Friday and pupils must compete and return it by Tuesday. It will take the form of a maths activity that recaps prior learning along with specific spellings for your child. In addition, your child may be given a short reading comprehension or SPaG activity to also complete. As a school, we also promote the use of Times Table Rockstars at home as this will help the children with their times table fluency.
